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# ABOUT US

The International Centre for the Prevention of Crime (ICPC) is an international non-governmental organization based in Montréal. It was established in 1994 by the governments of France, Canada, and Quebec. Its mission is to promote the adoption of international standards focused on crime prevention and criminal justice, with the goal of enhancing daily safety and improving the quality of life in communities, cities, and other local jurisdictions.

The ICPC supports the development and implementation of practical and effective policies, programs, and projects aimed at reducing crime and delinquency. It is also committed to developing innovative solutions to address the complex challenges posed by crime and violence, with a strong emphasis on research, capacity building, and knowledge transfer.

Working alongside member states, international and regional organizations, and authorities at all levels of government, the ICPC collaborates closely with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) and the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat). It maintains an active presence across the Americas, Europe, Africa, and Oceania. The Centre offers a broad range of technical and conceptual knowledge on crime prevention as well as related policies, practices, and tools to address the risk factors associated with crime, violence, and insecurity.

# KNOWLEDGE CENTRE

Every year, the ICPC produces and distributes a series of publications aimed at supporting government, institutional and community actors in their efforts to prevent crime and violence.

In 2024, the ICPC produced two thematic reports.

## **FEBRUARY 2024 - QUALITATIVE DATA COLLECTION PLAN: UPDATING GANG RECRUITMENT STRATEGIES TARGETING YOUTH**

This report highlights the factors contributing to the recruitment of young people into criminal activities, such as the influence of social networks, bad company, the quest for recognition, poverty and lack of opportunities.

The aim of this report is to provide essential information for understanding this phenomenon and proposing recommendations for improving safety in Laval, a Quebec city where crime, particularly gun-related crime, increased significantly in 2021.

## **APRIL 2024 - LOCAL SAFETY DIAGNOSIS FOR THE AGGLOMERATION OF LONGUEUIL**

The aim of this report is to paint a picture of safety among young people in the Longueuil agglomeration and to encourage community participation in safety issues.

The report also provides a qualitative analysis that was carried out in collaboration with local stakeholders, using consultative activities with young people in the agglomeration. Finally, the study proposes concrete recommendations and solutions, appropriate and adapted to local realities, to strengthen and create safer public spaces.

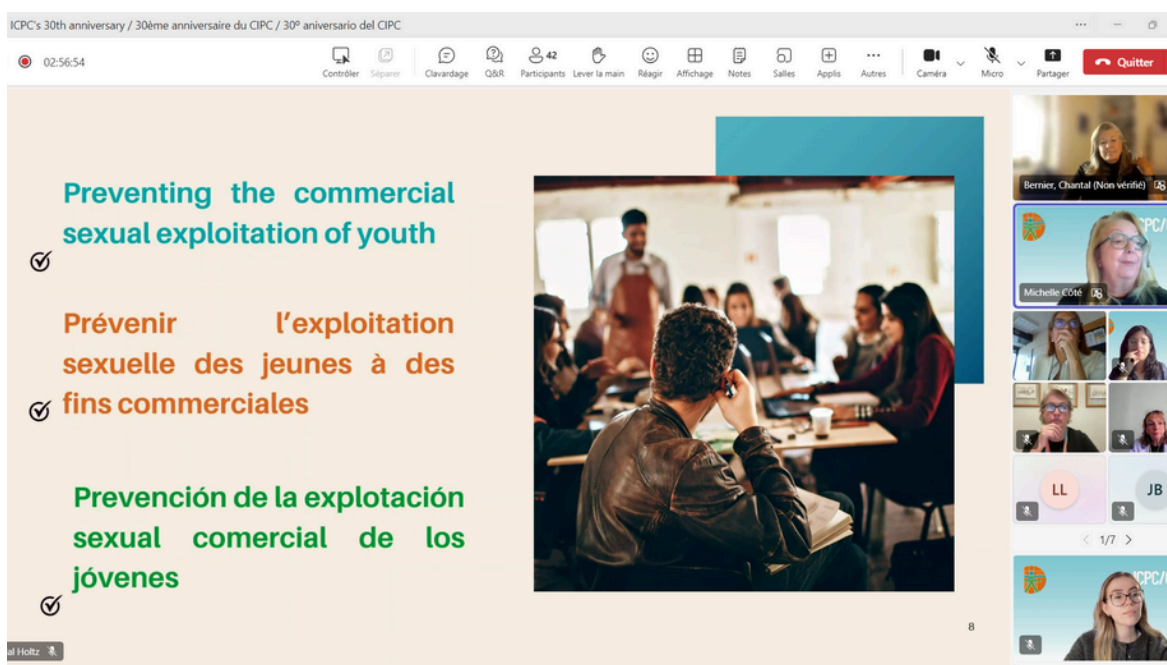
# EVENTS ORGANISED BY THE ICPC WITH ITS PARTNERS

## OCTOBER 8, 2024 – ICPC 30TH ANNIVERSARY WEBINAR

On October 8, 2024, the ICPC celebrated its 30 years of significant contributions to crime prevention by hosting a webinar attended by nearly fifty past and present partners and collaborators.

This milestone event reflected the ICPC's major achievements while exploring the evolution of global prevention strategies. Inspirational testimonials emphasized the ICPC's impact in diverse geopolitical contexts.

The webinar also introduced future challenges and upcoming projects, reaffirming ICPC's commitment to remaining at the forefront of prevention practices. The ICPC expressed deep gratitude to the participants, recognizing their role in the continued success of its mission and the importance of international cooperation in building safer, more resilient communities.



## **DECEMBER 5, 2024: WEBINAR TO MARK THE END OF THE MUNICIPAL SUPPORT PROGRAMME**

As part of the conclusion of the Programme de soutien aux municipalités (municipal support program), an innovative partnership initiated in 2019 by the Quebec Ministry of Public Security (MSP), a webinar was organized with all participating municipalities as well as community and institutional partners.

This ongoing commitment demonstrates our determination to strengthen safety in Quebec communities through a preventive and collaborative approach. Their engagement was essential in making the program a success and showing that public safety is a shared responsibility.

Since 2020, the ICPC has been contributing to the Municipal Support Programme (PSM), initiated by Quebec's Ministry of Public Security. This programme has enabled several municipalities with fewer than 10,000 inhabitants to develop local security assessments and structured preventive action plans, thereby strengthening their local capacity to respond to crime prevention issues. It culminated in the presentation of a final report in December 2024.





## **VISITS BY DELEGATIONS AND INTERNATIONAL MISSIONS**

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### **MARCH 20 TO 22, 2024 – 26TH ANNUAL GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND PARTICIPATION IN THE 8TH EDITION OF THE "SECURITY, DEMOCRACY & CITIES" CONFERENCE, BELGIUM**

In March 2024, ICPC participated in the "Security, Democracy & Cities" conference in Brussels, which brought together 700 experts from 26 countries to discuss urban security, including drug trafficking, misinformation, and terrorism.

At the same time, the ICPC held its 26th annual general meeting in Brussels, both in person and virtually. Anna Rau and Barbara Holtmann were welcomed to the board of directors. This meeting provided an opportunity to present the year's achievements, new reports, and international events.

Finally, Ann Champoux, Frédérique Porterie, and Jean-Luc Besson met with Étienne Apaire in Paris to discuss partnerships with France on crime prevention and radicalization.



## JULY AND AUGUST 2024 – LATIN AMERICA

ICPC participated in two key events in Latin America, reinforcing its role in urban security and prevention. On July 24, at the International Security Congress in Querétaro, ICPC highlighted the importance of community policing and presented its initiatives through its Urban Safety Laboratory.



On August 21, in Nuevo León and Guanajuato, it shared expertise in crime analysis and explored partnerships to support local prevention strategies. These actions illustrate ICPC's commitment to collaborating with local actors for safer and more sustainable cities.

## **NOVEMBER 13 TO 15, 2024 – PARTICIPATION AND EXPERT PRESENTATION AT THE UN CRIME PREVENTION MEETING, RIYADH, SAUDI ARABIA**

Ann Champoux, Director General of ICPC, participated in the 2024 coordination meeting of the UN Network on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice (PNI) in Riyadh, thereby strengthening our mission within the CCPCJ of the UNODC. Discussions focused on the 2030 goals of the Kyoto Declaration on crime prevention, with members presenting their initiatives against international crime.



The ICPC took advantage of this event to showcase its innovative work, particularly the Urban Safety Laboratory and its research on safety in mobility. By engaging with global experts and decision-makers, the ICPC reinforced its commitment to promoting strategies that foster justice and public safety, and to building safer, more inclusive communities worldwide.





## ICPC PARTICIPATION IN EVENTS

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### **MAY 30, 2024 – STRENGTHENING SECURITY IN CANADA: STRATEGIC MEETING BETWEEN ICPC AND THE CANADIAN GOVERNMENT**

On May 30, Ann Champoux, Director General of ICPC, met with Dominic LeBlanc, Minister of Public Safety, and Deputy Minister Shawn Tupper. This meeting allowed discussion of ICPC's mission, current crime challenges, and prevention needs in Canada. It highlighted the importance of collaboration between institutional, community, associative, and private sectors to enhance security nationwide.

This exchange marks an important milestone in strengthening partnerships between ICPC and Canadian authorities, reaffirming the organization's commitment to working with public institutions to develop prevention strategies tailored to Canadian communities.



## **OCTOBER 16, 2024 – PRESENTATION AT THE 2ND EDITION OF SYNERGIE, DIALOGUE ON URBAN VIOLENCE, CITY OF LAVAL**

At the second edition of Synergie, Dialogue sur la violence urbaine, organized by the City of Laval in partnership with PLAN, Alexis St-Maurice, analyst and project manager, and Michelle Côté, scientific advisor of ICPC, presented recent delinquency trends in Laval to over 150 participants. These findings stemmed from fieldwork involving 20 key stakeholders.

The event facilitated discussions on prevention methods and challenges related to delinquency, as well as next steps for the Plan d'action pour la sécurité et le bien-être collectifs 2024-2034, funded by the governments of Canada and Quebec.



## NOVEMBER 4 AND 5, 2024 – PARTICIPATION IN THE CRIME PREVENTION SYMPOSIUM, DRUMMONDVILLE

ICPC participated in the crime prevention symposium in Drummondville, organized as part of Crime Prevention Week by the Quebec Ministry of Public Security. Under the theme “S’allier pour des milieux de vie sécuritaires pour tous” (Uniting for safe living environments for all), the event gathered over one hundred local, regional, and municipal actors.

Michelle Côté, ICPC’s scientific advisor, contributed to the panel on the future of crime prevention in Quebec. ICPC also maintained a booth throughout the event.

The symposium highlighted the importance of a holistic approach and multisectoral collaboration to prevent youth involvement in criminal behavior. Persistent challenges related to COVID-19, such as housing access difficulties and increased violence, were discussed, emphasizing the need for tailored action plans and strengthened frontline support to promote equal rights and social cohesion.







## ACTIVITIES OF OUR NETWORKS AND PARTNERS

## **PARTICIPATION IN PARTNER ACTIVITIES**

### **FEBRUARY 5, 2024 – CONFERENCE ON COMBATING HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN THE AMERICAS, ONLINE**

ICPC attended online the seventh meeting of national authorities on human trafficking, organized by the Organization of American States (OAS) in Washington. The meeting addressed combating human trafficking in the Americas, focusing on sexual exploitation and forced labor.



The Canadian delegation emphasized the importance of public awareness and reporting abuses. The conference highlighted technology's role in trafficking, the need for international cooperation, and discussed climate change impacts on human trafficking.



## THE ICPC PARTICIPATED IN FORENSIA'S SECOND SYMPOSIUM ON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, HELD IN FEBRUARY 2024 IN MONTREAL.

The event aimed to enrich knowledge and broaden intervention perspectives on domestic violence.

It brought together professionals including criminologists, social workers, doctors, and researchers. Presentations covered diverse themes such as LGBTQ+ inclusion, Indigenous realities, and consequences of sexual violence. The symposium also highlighted effective intervention programs like "Étincelle" (for ages 15-17) and "Constellation" (for ages 17-24), underscoring the importance of collaboration between research and practice to combat domestic violence.





## **APRIL 11 – CYBERSECURITY CONFERENCE ORGANIZED BY RAYMOND CHABOT GRANT THORNTON AND MONTRÉAL INTERNATIONAL**

Led by Guillaume Caron from VARS – Cybersecurity, the conference addressed post-COVID cybersecurity challenges and compliance with Quebec’s Law 25. It highlighted the impact of cyberattacks such as ransomware and phishing on organizations, with nearly 30% experiencing revenue losses. The importance of awareness, action plans, and solutions like two-factor authentication was emphasized.



## APRIL 25, 2024 – ICPC PARTICIPATION IN MONTRÉAL INTERNATIONAL'S ANNUAL GENERAL ASSEMBLY

This annual meeting highlighted the essential contribution of international investments, multinational entities, and international experts from the network of international organizations to which we belong, in the development of Greater Montréal.

The assembly was followed by a networking cocktail attended by nearly 300 people, allowing our team to strengthen connections with members of the Montréal International Community.

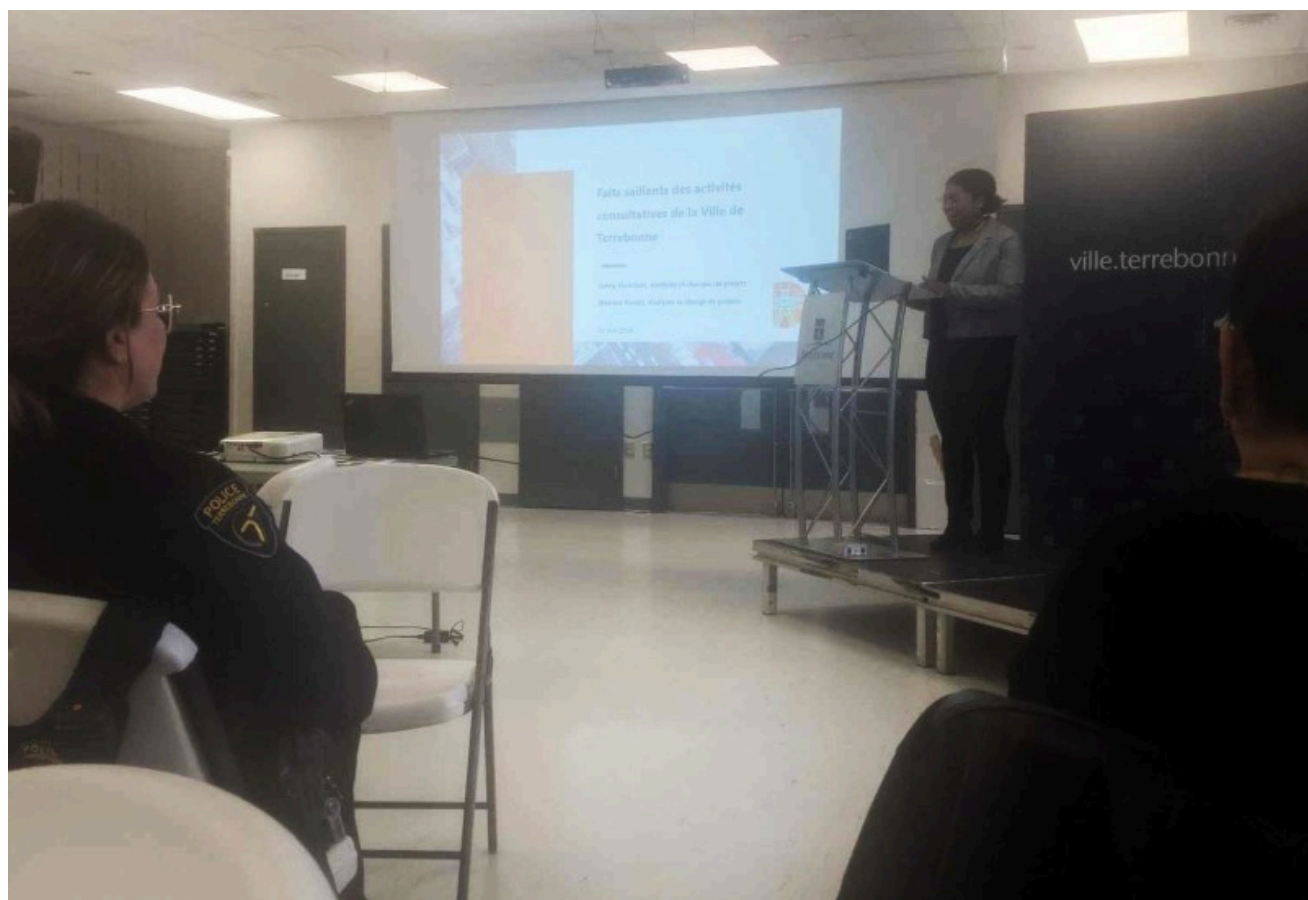




## **MAY 2, 2024 – PRESENTATION AT THE CITY OF TERREBONNE'S FORUM ON YOUTH SECURITY AND VIOLENCE PREVENTION**

On May 2, 2024, we participated in a Forum on security and violence prevention for youth aged 10 to 25, organized by the City of Terrebonne. Mandated to conduct a local security diagnosis, we presented key findings from consultations with citizens and stakeholders.

This rigorous approach, enriched by data from the Quebec Ministry of Public Security, targeted focus groups, and a survey collecting 840 responses, enabled better understanding of local concerns and the development of tailored strategies.



## **MAY 27 TO 31, 2024 – 2024 CONFERENCE OF THE CANADIAN CENTRE FOR COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND PREVENTION OF VIOLENCE**

Organized by the Canadian Centre for Community Engagement and Prevention of Violence, the conference on combating radicalization leading to violence, themed “Local Responses to Global Pressures,” gathered 400 participants from 15 countries.

This event facilitated enriching exchanges on local responses to global pressures, strengthening ICPC’s network with international experts. The week was crucial to enhancing ICPC initiatives in preventing radicalization and violence by drawing inspiration from shared best practices.



## SEPTEMBER 14, 2024 – PARTICIPATION IN THE 3RD EDITION OF THE CITY OF MONT-ROYAL SECURITY EXHIBITION

On September 14, ICPC participated in the 3rd edition of the security exhibition organized by Mont-Royal Public Security in Montréal.

The event brought together public security partners such as the SPVM, STM, RCMP, and Hydro-Québec to raise public awareness on crime prevention. ICPC presented its initiatives and strengthened its local network through exchanges with the public and stakeholders.



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## **RÉSEAU D'ÉCHANGE ET DE SOUTIEN AUX ACTIONS LOCALES - MONTRÉAL**

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For the seventh consecutive year, ICPC coordinated RÉSAL, a network composed of 12 member organizations and institutions all focused on exchanging initiatives to prevent violence among youth aged 12 to 25 in Montréal.

As coordinator of RÉSAL, ICPC plays a key role in organizing and facilitating exchanges among diverse actors involved in youth violence prevention in Montréal. We facilitate collaboration among institutional, community, and associative partners to strengthen local initiatives' impact and ensure coordinated responses tailored to youth needs.

RÉSAL Coordination Committee meetings held on:

- February 7, 2024: 62nd Coordination Committee meeting (in-person)
- April 17, 2024: 63rd Coordination Committee meeting (online, Teams)
- September 18, 2024: 64th Coordination Committee meeting (in-person)
- October 30, 2024: 65th Coordination Committee meeting (online, Teams)

With the aim of better supporting young people in complex situations, RÉSAL organised four themed training sessions in 2024.

- The first, led by Annie Grenier and Christiane Girard on 23 February, with a second edition on 30 May, focused on trauma across life domains approaches for young people.
- The second training session, held on 28 February by Estelle Cazelaïs, was entitled 'Protagonist of your pleasure: cybersexuality and cyberviolence'.
- The third training session was held on 25 September in person on radicalisation leading to violence and hateful acts, funded by the Prévention Montréal programme.





# COOPERATION CENTRE

In 2024, the ICPC consolidated its position as a key platform for the implementation of collaborative projects, thereby contributing to concrete and measurable impacts that benefit communities and territories.



## TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE & SUPPORT FOR STAKEHOLDERS

In 2024, ICPC continued its commitment to developing activities in urban insecurity prevention and local capacity building, consolidating its leadership position in Quebec, particularly in Montréal.

For the fifth consecutive year, thanks to its Urban Security Laboratory, ICPC continued developing and providing tailored, accessible tools to meet municipalities' and stakeholders' specific needs. These tools include dashboards, indicator systems, strategic planning methodologies, monitoring and evaluation tools, local security diagnostics, action research projects, and best practice reviews.

Some projects benefited from funding under the Programme innovation et développement d'expertise (PIDE), aimed at preventing and combating firearm and gang-related violence while addressing Quebec's specific priorities.



## **SEPTEMBER – OCTOBER 2024: CONCEPT NOTE ON ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE**

Funded by the Quebec Ministry of Public Security, a concept note titled “Intelligence artificielle, prévention, prédiction et criminalité” (Artificial Intelligence, Prevention, Prediction, and Crime) was produced in September 2024. This note aims to describe crime manifestations facilitated by artificial intelligence by developing a glossary on AI and definitions of main AI-related offenses. It also opens the discussion on various perspectives surrounding AI in the Quebec context.

## **CONTINUATION OF THE PAJAC PROJECT**

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### **DECEMBER 2024: PORTRAIT OF CRIME IN THE AHUNTSIC-CARTIERVILLE BOROUGH**

As part of the Projet Action Jeunesse for the Ahuntsic-Cartierville borough in Montréal, established in 2023, a crime profile was completed in December 2024. Developed in collaboration with the community organization Crime Prevention Ahuntsic-Cartierville (PCAC), this profile presents trends in crimes against persons and property crimes in Ahuntsic-Cartierville from 2018 to 2022.

The report was presented during the first meeting of the advisory committee of Crime Prevention Ahuntsic-Cartierville.

## **SUPPORT ACTIVITIES OF THE URBAN SECURITY LABORATORY (LABSU) MONTRÉAL**

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In 2024, LabSU strengthened its strategic role by providing valuable advisory expertise to the City of Montréal and its boroughs. This collaboration supported several targeted technical assistance projects addressing local priorities in urban security and crime prevention.

LabSU is distinguished by its ability to bridge academic research and field practices in a continuous improvement approach to urban security strategies. Since its creation, it has developed and offered innovative and adaptable tools, including dashboards, indicator systems, strategic planning methodologies, monitoring and evaluation, best practice reviews, in-depth diagnostics, and action research projects.

Some projects were funded through the Innovation and Expertise Development Program (PIDE), mobilizing research and intervention fields and responding to federal government concerns. It addresses Quebec's priorities in preventing and combating firearm and gang-related violence.





## **AUGUST 2024**

- Detailed statistical analysis of crime in the Saint-Laurent borough. This analysis provides an overview of criminal cases and the individuals involved in Saint-Laurent borough for 2022.
- Overall profile of criminal cases and involved persons for the 2,509 OMHM in the Montréal agglomeration (boroughs and related cities) from 2018 to 2022.

## **MAY 2024**

- Presentation of a survey tool on citizens' sense of security and well-being in the Montréal agglomeration: ICPC developed a population survey tool following the identified need to better understand the population's insecurity levels and appreciation of services. ICPC can support municipalities in adapting the survey to local realities, implementation strategy, and data analysis.
- General analysis of non-consensual intimate image distribution crimes in the Montréal agglomeration (2018-2022).

In 2024, even though opportunities for media visibility were limited, the ICPC maintained strategic monitoring, prepared the necessary materials for responsive communication, consolidated its tools, and ensured the consistency of its messages in support of its prevention and awareness-raising missions.

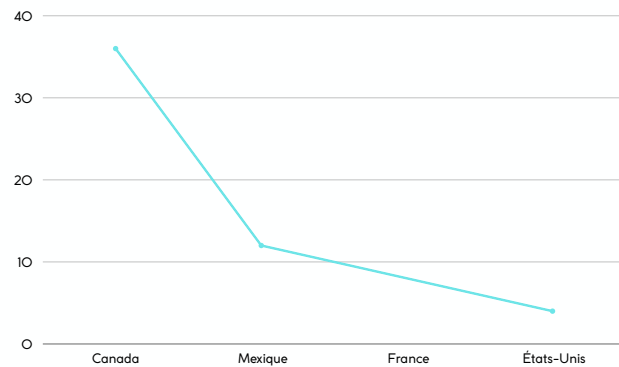
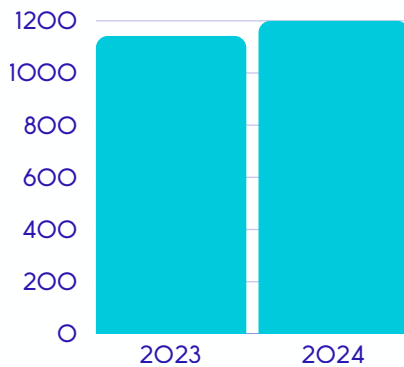

## ICPC GOVERNANCE

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The ICPC Board of Directors plays a crucial role in the strategic direction and smooth operation of the organization. Composed of professionals from diverse geographical and sectoral backgrounds, the Board embodies the diversity and expertise necessary to address global challenges in crime prevention.

In 2024, we had the honor of welcoming three new members:

- Barbara Holtmann, whose expertise in governance and community security enriches strategic discussions.
- Anna Rau, Director of the German European Forum on Urban Security, bringing valuable international perspective through her experience in Europe.
- Didier Deramond, Executive Director of the Association of Police Chiefs of Quebec, whose deep knowledge of the Quebec policing environment is an undeniable asset.

## **ICPC GOVERNANCE MEETINGS**

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In 2024, the ICPC Board of Directors held several strategic meetings to ensure rigorous governance and guide the organization's directions. These meetings helped reinforce priority areas, assess ongoing project results, and define perspectives for future initiatives. ICPC warmly thanks the Board members for their commitment and valuable contribution to the mission of crime prevention.

## **EVOLUTION OF THE GENERAL BUDGET**

Total revenues for 2024 decreased by 20% from 2023. Total expenses decreased by 18%, with a significant decrease in human resources costs (we kept hiring to a bare minimum in 2024 given the uncertainty of project funding until the autumn), whereas operating expenses remained stable, and travel costs were reduced by 30%.

Operating expenses will be further reduced in 2025, as in September 2024 the Centre for the Prevention of Radicalization Leading to Violence (CPRMV) moved into our offices and now share 50% of the rent and office expenses with the ICPC.

## **FINANCES**

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2024 was another extremely challenging year for the ICPC in terms of financing, which finally concluded on a positive note with the confirmation of three multi-year agreements with the provincial and federal governments. Until September however, we were obliged to run the Centre on a shoestring in the absence of confirmation of this funding.

Negotiations with the MSP Quebec for a second three-year agreement for the Laboratory on Urban Safety, funding that has given the Centre a certain stability since 2021, were concluded with a signed agreement in September for CAD 200,000 per financial year. Another two-year agreement with MSP Quebec was signed in November for CAD 100,000 per financial year (2024/2025 and 2025/2026), in the form of a grant to support projects in major urban centres aimed at contributing to the prevention of gun and gang-related violence, financed by the Fonds pour bâtir des communautés plus sécuritaires (FBCS).

The agreement with the City of Montréal for their contribution to the Urban Safety Lab, using the funding model introduced in 2023 that gives the ICPC a bank of hours to be used for specific mandates received from our partner, was renewed for a second year in April 2024.

## **FINANCES (SUITE)**

Whilst we appreciate the ongoing support of the City, this model has continued to render financial planning more challenging in the past, as under 50% of the \$100,000 agreement was used by the end of our financial year.

Finally, at the very end of the year, we received notification that our application for a three-year grant from the federal government for a project on safety in public transport in the five largest urban centres in Canada was approved. Work on this project will begin in early 2025.

The absence of core funding for 2024 has had a major impact on our ability to fund activities that were not project based. This, combined with the fact that we were unable to work on activities within the multi-year agreements reached in the fall for the 2024-2025 financial year, and therefore can only account for a minimal revenue for these projects in 2024, has led to our financial statements showing a deficit of \$96,019.

A total of 271,771\$ of project revenues was deferred to 2025 for work that is ongoing; thus, we intend to make up for some of this deficit in 2025 with much of the year dedicated to the long-term projects signed in late 2024.

On a more positive note, we continued to benefit from diverse sources of funding for our activities including the final year of the 2022-2025 agreement with the Government of Quebec for the prevention of sexual exploitation project, and numerous smaller projects with the City of Montréal and several Quebec municipalities.

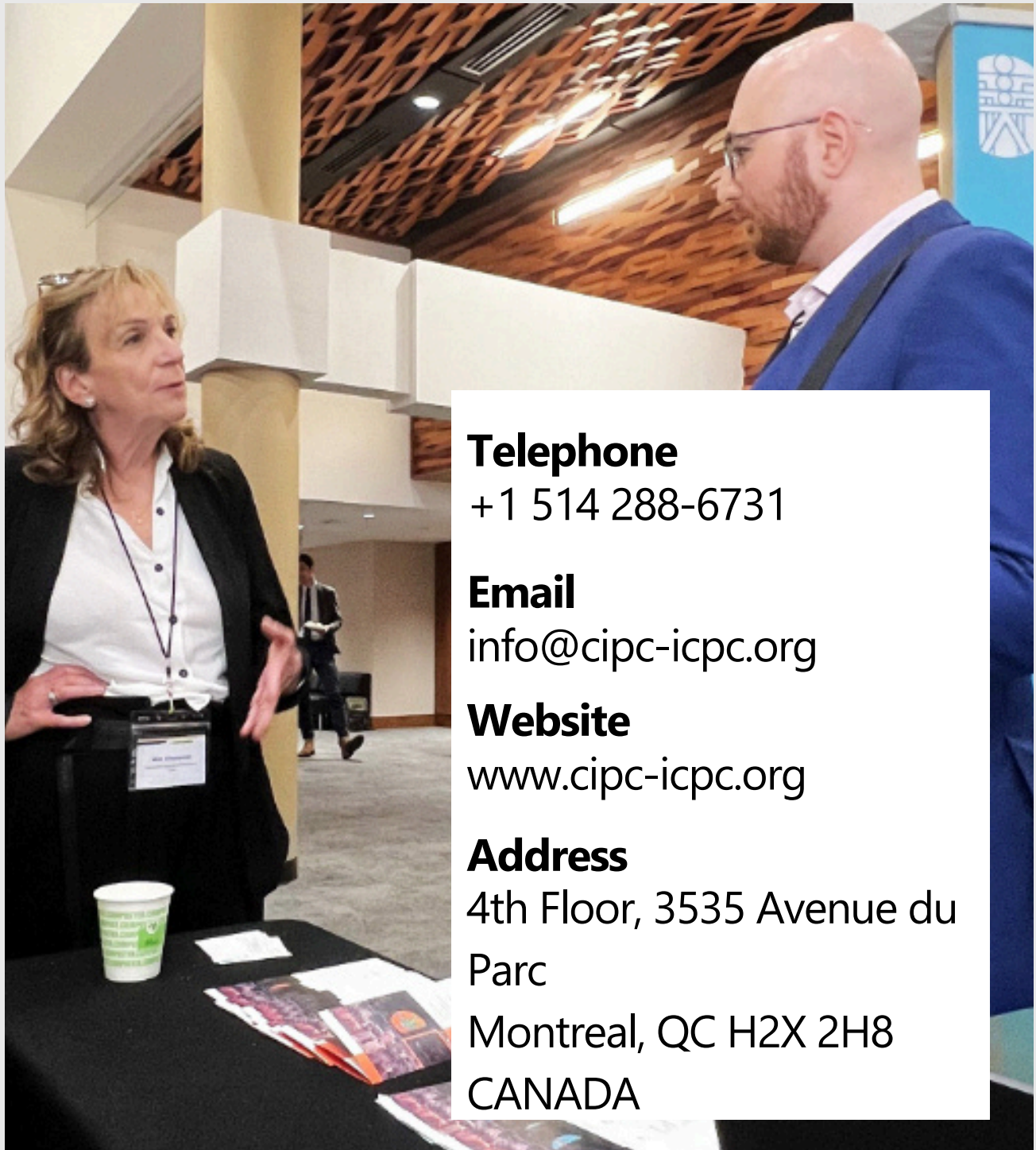
